

The Life of a Tabernacle Project



1 Once funds are available, we notify the national church leaders who are responsible for determining where the tabernacle goes. A church must demonstrate sustainability, possess its own property, have a functioning board, etc. to receive a tabernacle. The picture to the left represents a group waiting for a tabernacle and, while not in a school, the picture on the right demonstrates the type of structure many are meeting in who aren't even fortunate to have a classroom.



2 Our team then fabricates the tabernacle at our ministry center in Lusaka. They also travel to the church in advance to survey the site and build the footings with the local church. We are then ready to erect the tabernacle, which takes approximately two days!



3 Once the tabernacle is erected, the church will normally schedule and outreach and celebration weekend. On Sunday, the tabernacle is formally handed over. As you can see, it consists of a steel frame and roof. The local church is then responsible to complete the project.



4 At the dedication of the tabernacle, the pastor, elders, and congregation are given a spiritual charge and ordained to carry on the work of God in that community!

5 The congregation now completes the walls and interior as they raise the money. Meanwhile, they have a secure place to meet and from which to minister to the community. The work of God is secure in another community!
